Dear Mr. Hopkins:

The six specimens of diseased brood which you sent August 2nd, were received, and I wish to make the following report on them:

All these samples showed the gross characters of American foul brood, and all of them have been examined bacteriologically. Bacillus larvae was found in the scales of each, confirming the original diagnosis. You will also be interested in knowing that in carrying out our experiments on this disease, we have used, among others, a pure culture of Bacillus larvae isolated from one of the samples which you sent. Cultures of Bacillus larvae from your samples have the same cultural characters as do those isolated from samples obtained here. Some of these cultures from your samples were fed to colonies as described in Circular No. 94, of this Bureau, with the result that the disease was produced as described in this publication. You are then able to say distinctly that American foul brood exists in New Zealand and that it is caused by Bacillus larvae.

We are very glad indeed to receive these samples from you and to make the report of the findings. In case you find any dead brood which in any way resembles what we call Eurospean foul brood, we shall be very glad to receive samples for examination. Samples of this disease are much more likely to mould so as to make them unfit for examination, so that it is desirable that they be dried thoroughly before shipping.

The publication of the results of honey analyses has been somewhat delayed, but this bulletin will be issued in a short time. I shall see to it that a copy is sent to you.

I wish again to thank you for your kindness in sending these samples and, if we can be of any service to you, I shall be very glad to hear from you.

If you find any more disease of similar nature, we should be very glad indeed to have you send it. The other samples (No. 309) are American foul brood.

I am very glad to get the notice concerning the poisonous honey which you sent me, and also the final copy of your Apiaries Act. I am glad to know that you succeeded in getting a bill passed which would make it necessary for all bee keepers to keep their bees in frame hives. I wish we could get something like that in this country. It certainly should result in great good to apiculture in New Zealand and I congratulate you on it.

I hope soon to send you some additional publications on apiculture.
