NEW ZEALAND HONEY. SALES SHOW INCREASE.

New Zealand honey is not showing the effects of the general slump. The agents (C. and E. Morton, Ltd.) report that last August they advanced the

price of "Imperial Bee" honey, and sales were very much greater than in any one month since 1921 (states a

London correspondent).

Four the four months, August-November of last year, sales have been 17 per cent. above the corresponding months of the previous year. In Germany, where New Zealand honey has a strong market, the financial situation renders it impossible to do much more than mark time, but in Holland good progress is being made.
