The ten queen bees despatched to you from the Apiculture Department, Ontario Agricultural College, Ontario, receched the National Airways Office, Wellington, on the 31st October and were collected by the Animal Research Station on the same day. Unfortunately, when the box containing the bees was opened both queens and stendant bees were all found to be deed. The supply of candy in the central compartment containing the attendant bees was completely exhausted and these bees had died of starvation. The queen cages ranged round this compartment still had ample supplies of candy, however, and it appears that the queens had died of exposure. The bees had all died offer due to the Wellington.

The dead bees and cages were burnt at Wallaceville as is the custom with such equipment.

I understand that no authority was obtained for the importation of these bees. I am therefore forwarding copies of all correspondence in connection with this consignment to the Director-General of Agriculture for his consideration.

We have been advised by Mr. T. Palmer-Jones, Research Officer of the Wallaceville Animal Research Station that a small shipment of sample Queen Bees, specially bred by the Department of Apiculture, Ontario University, Ganada, and shipped to us by the Professor of Apiculture, arrived at the Wallaceville Research Station completely dead. This is very much regretted.

The Research Officer also mentions that no authority was obtained for the importation of these bees. We were entirely unaware of any regulations relating to the importation of Queens as the history of beek-keeping in New Zealand had its origin in the importation of Queen Bees from the United States and other countries.

Presumably we still have something we can learn from the tremendous amount of research being done in this regard and hence, as a major producer in this country, we are anxious and willing to learn from these research stations, including our own here in New Zealand.

The shipment of Queens was a gift to us and in view of the unsatisfactory shipping arrangements, we would like to ask for a further sample shipment. Your permission to do so would be much appreciated.

As pointed out in my letter of the 7th November, an import license is required from the Comptroller of Customs. The only goods exempted from this requirement are the following:-
