Dear Sir.

I have received your letter of 28th May, 1951, regarding the importation of bees from Australia.

You should first make application to this office for the necessary authority to import bees, stating the variety (race) and number of Queen bees you wish to import, elso the name and address of the breeder of the bees. I attach for your information a copy of the conditions which must be complied with in any case where authority is granted.

With regard to races of bees. Successful development and maintenance of good strains of Italian bees which are considered best for New Zealand conditions, would be impossible if temportationar of dark coloured strains of bees are allowed to be imported. It is most unlikely therefore that any application for authority to import Caucasian bees would be granted.

Any authority to import bees issued by this Department would be subject to a successful application for an import license from the Comptroller of Customs. Wellington.
